Successful Research Seminar

More than 50 people attended a combined research seminar of the Friends of the Orphan Schools Research Group and the Female Convicts Research Group in the Old Sunday School on Saturday 9 April. Members from both groups presented an interesting and varied selection of papers.

Andrew Cocker told the story of his great-great grandmother, Sarah Briggs. Sarah's mother died on their voyage to Australia and she was subsequently placed in the Orphan School. Andrea Gerrard gave an interesting and well-researched paper which explored three generations of the Quamby and Taylor families and their connection to the Orphan Schools.

Grant Finlay, a postgraduate student

from the University of Tasmania, spoke about Aboriginal children in the Orphan Schools. Lucy Frost told an interesting story about John Offer, a school master in the Orphan Schools and Ann McLeavy explained the history and struggle of her Irish forebears transported to Van Diemen's Land.

Our research group was well represented – besides Andrew's and Andrea's papers Joyce Purtscher explored people's reluctance to admit they or their family members had been admitted to the Orphan Schools,



Rosie Davidson shared some of her research about the burial ground and Toni Sherwood presented some observations about the experience of childhood outside the Orphan Schools.

During the lunch break Joyce and Rosie led a tour of the Precinct, which included the rear section of the Infant Orphan Schools. The group paused in the vicinity of the former Roman Catholic Burial Ground where they scattered rose petals in memory of the orphan children buried there.

Fox's Feast

Our annual Fox's Feast Picnic Day was held on 27 February. This year the weather, although cool, was fine enough for a picnic, which most of us did in St John's Orchard, the garden of the Lenah Links community group.
